



Dorothy Voss

February 27, 1930 - July 25, 2025

After ninety-five years of dreaming and doing, Dorothy Voss has passed the torch to those she has inspired.

Dorothy was born and raised in 1930 in Chicago (Roseland) and came to Holland, Michigan in 1948 to attend Hope College. After graduating in 1952 with an English degree, she wed Leon J. Voss of Holland, and they started their married life in Northern Michigan where Dorothy used her writing skills documenting patient cases as a psychiatric social worker for the Traverse City State Hospital while Leon was stationed at the U.S.Coast Guard Air Station Traverse City. When Leon's enlistment was completed, they moved back to Holland, then Zeeland, where they raised five children.

During the 1970s, in addition to being a substitute teacher at Zeeland High, Dorothy was active on the Zeeland City Planning Commission and was appointed to ZEAL: Zeeland Environmental Action Leadership, a panel of business executives and community leaders seeking to define potential improvements to shared space, including the downtown area, historical preservation and recreation. One of the panel's findings was the need to start gathering and documenting artifacts and stories of local history. Dorothy soon became a founding member of the Zeeland Historical Society and was appointed as its first chair. After the property was purchased, became the volunteer director of The Dekker Huis Museum. Although many people were

involved in the Society, Dorothy and Wilma Veldheer were a core team, spending countless hours collecting artifacts, hosting shows and events, and learning how to build a museum as they built it. After retirement from formal roles, Dorothy remained an active member of the Zeeland Historical Society by researching, publishing books and developing a series of interpretive signs around Zeeland.

For five years, Dorothy also served as Executive Director of the Zeeland Chamber of Commerce, growing membership from 175 to 230 businesses, setting up an Ambassadors group and a program to train future civic leaders, and organizing an Industrial Retention Survey.

Dorothy was a long-time member of the First Reformed Church in Zeeland, where she enjoyed singing in the choir, editing the newsletter, teaching, and tutoring for Kid's Hope. She was very proud of her Dutch heritage and her travels included many trips to the Netherlands, including the "Roots and Branches" Witte tour she organized and led for the 150th anniversary of Zeeland's founding.

Dorothy is survived by her children, Mike (Diane) Voss of Grand Haven, Judy, Valerie and Laura Voss of Zeeland, Brian (Roxanne) Voss of Holland, granddaughters Jenna (Justin) Grewal of Ann Arbor and Erin (Matt) Viening of Norton Shores, and by great-grandchildren Eliza and Madalynne Viening, and Elden and Leon Grewal, and brother-in-law Dr. John (Lynda) Voss of Waterloo, Ontario, a niece and several nephews.

Dorothy was preceded in death by her husband Leon in 1994, and her parents, Sofrides and Anna Fennema.

There will be a time of visitation from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, July 29 at Yntema Funeral Home, 251 South State Street in Zeeland. A private service is planned.

The family appreciates the care and kindnesses Dorothy received at Royal Atrium Inn Assisted Living over the past year.
