“I met George in my role as a volunteer with Hospice of Holland. While it was a challenge to communicate with him due to his hearing loss we, nevertheless, had some great chats. He was always soft spoken and patient. One of the best things we did during our limited time together was to share WW2 picture books with each other. As I turned the pages slowly he would nod, smile and point with a grin as if to say "that is what I did when I was in the war!" It was a truly touching experience to have George look at me, get a tear in his eye and say "thank you for coming to visit me!" as he wrapped his arms around me in a great big bear hug! Transitions for the elderly (indeed, all of us for that matter!) are never easy. For George however, he simply wanted to go home and was often focused on that simple request of me. At one time he offered to bargain with me if I would simply return him to his home in Hamilton as he said "if you do that for me I will put a good word in for you when I meet the Lord..." George was secure in his faith and believed fervently that heaven was his destination. I respect and admire George as a fine man and a hero of his generation. It was my privilege to get to know him in the last few weeks of his life."
