Harold Bell, age 75, passed away unexpectedly on Tuesday, February 15, 2022.

Harold was raised in Kentucky and was drafted into the United States Army where he served from 1968-1971. After college he became a teacher in the Grand Blanc Community school system where he taught for 30 years. Together with his wife, Judy Bell, they taught over 6000 students collectively. He and Judy retired and spent the last 20 years in the Holland area where they became great friends with their neighbors in the Pine Island community. He and Judy were married for 42 years of which they are very grateful. He was loved and will be dearly missed.

He is preceded in death by his in-laws, Walter and Ruth Herbst.

He is survived by his wife, Judy Bell.

“ *Harold became my mentor and friend when I joined the Reid staff in Grand Blanc. He helped another teacher and I introduce literature books into the classroom in place of basal readers. With his help we chose books that were appropriate for beginning, middle, and end of the year second grade students, and years later when researchers leveled books for guided reading, we learned the choices he helped us make were spot on. As a reading specialist he spent time in my classroom each day, focusing on struggling readers but assisting all students. He was outspoken about what he believed was best for readers and learners, and served as a role model for me in my career. Once he and another teacher served as my "attorneys" when I fought a "ticket" for running in the hall at a mock staff trial, and he won my case! When Harold retired he gave me a small stool that I used for the rest of my teaching career-especially when I was reading to my class. He would have loved that. I still have it and remember him fondly every time I look at it. Harold had a huge impact on the teacher I became and I will always be grateful to him.
